LEND stresses the importance of interprofessional, patient- and family-centered, culturally competent, community-coordinated

services for infants, children, adolescents, and adults with neurodevelopmental disabilities and their families. The goal of the program is to prepare students for leadership roles in the field of maternal and child health, including interprofessional clinical care and public health service. In addition to graduate and postgraduate students, the program includes family- and self-advocates to provide a perspective of lived experience to the trainees. Applicants from diverse racial, cultural, and ethnic backgrounds, as well as students with disabilities, are encouraged to apply.

VCL also collaborates with myriad educational opportunities for practicing health care professionals, including autism screening workshops; interprofessional continuing professional development events; and family workshops.

The competency-based comprehensive curriculum includes:
