Four statewide organizations in Tennessee partner to improve our state’s services and supports for people with developmental disabilities. These organizations are guided by input from people with disabilities and their family members, who help us know what is working and where the gaps are. Together, we are working to promote the goals of the federal DD Act:

- Independence
- Inclusion
- Integration
- Productivity
- Self-Determination

Our Developmental Disabilities Network can help you:

- Better understand and navigate the disability services system for yourself, a family member, or client.
- Provide input that will help improve services and supports.
- Become an informed and involved advocate for people with disabilities.

The federal Developmental Disabilities Act created State Councils, Protection and Advocacy Systems, and University Centers for Excellence in every state and U.S. territory. The Act was written by people with developmental disabilities, their families, and disability policy experts, and guides each agency’s activities.

Tennessee is a national leader in how closely our DD Act agencies work together. Our national network of DD Act agencies is organized under the U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services.

DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITY

A developmental disability is significant and ongoing, begins before age 22, and typically requires support in several areas of daily living. A developmental disability can be physical, intellectual, or a combination of both. For example, people with developmental disabilities often rely on assistance to move around, communicate, or take care of their daily needs. There are more than 106,000 individuals with developmental disabilities in Tennessee.

HOW THE NETWORK WORKS TOGETHER

Tennessee’s Developmental Disabilities Network agencies align their work with the Developmental Disabilities Act. We accomplish more by working collectively. We have joined to:

- Improve transition services for students with disabilities getting ready to graduate from high school.
- Promote higher education opportunities (college programs) for students with developmental disabilities.
- Grow employment opportunities for adults with disabilities.
- Support advocates with a developmental disability to mentor their peers.





DISABILITY RIGHTS TENNESSEE

Disability Rights Tennessee (DRT) is the designated federal Protection & Advocacy System for people with disabilities in Tennessee. DRT provides free legal advocacy services to protect the civil and human rights of Tennesseans with disabilities.

Mission: To protect the rights of Tennesseans with disabilities.

Activities: DRT concentrates its work in three areas: freedom from harm, freedom from discrimination, and freedom to participate in the community. DRT collects input from community members to identify areas of work under each strategic area. The Areas of Work help determine the types of direct advocacy and legal cases DRT can accept. Services DRT offers include:

- Information & Referral
- Investigation of Abuse & Neglect
- Advocacy Services
- Legal Representation
- Education & Outreach
- Public Policy Advocacy

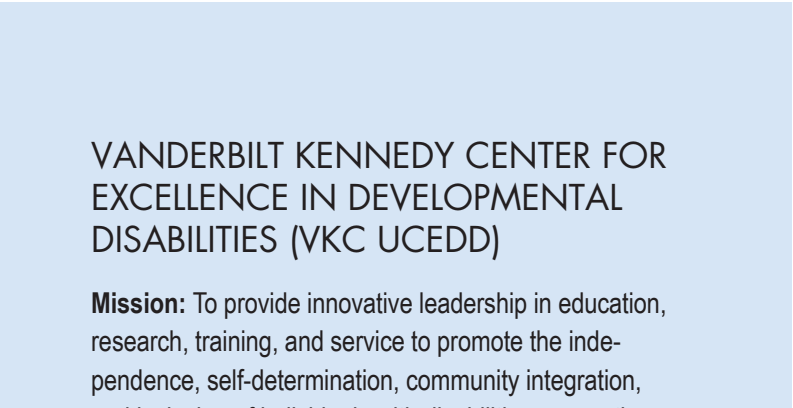
UNIVERSITY OF TENNESSEE CENTER ON DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES

Mission: To promote, support, and enhance the independence, productivity, integration, and inclusion of individuals with disabilities and their families in the community.

- Activities:**
- Interdisciplinary family-centered clinical services for children with developmental disabilities and their families
 - Interdisciplinary graduate-level leadership training in developmental disabilities
 - Family-centered programs supporting children in relative care and in state custody
 - Parenting support groups
 - Rural physician training in early identification, screening, and diagnosis of developmental disabilities
 - Sponsorship of and presentations at local, state, regional, national, and international disability-related conferences
 - Support and collaboration in provision of training, resources, and support with transition and employment services for people with disabilities
