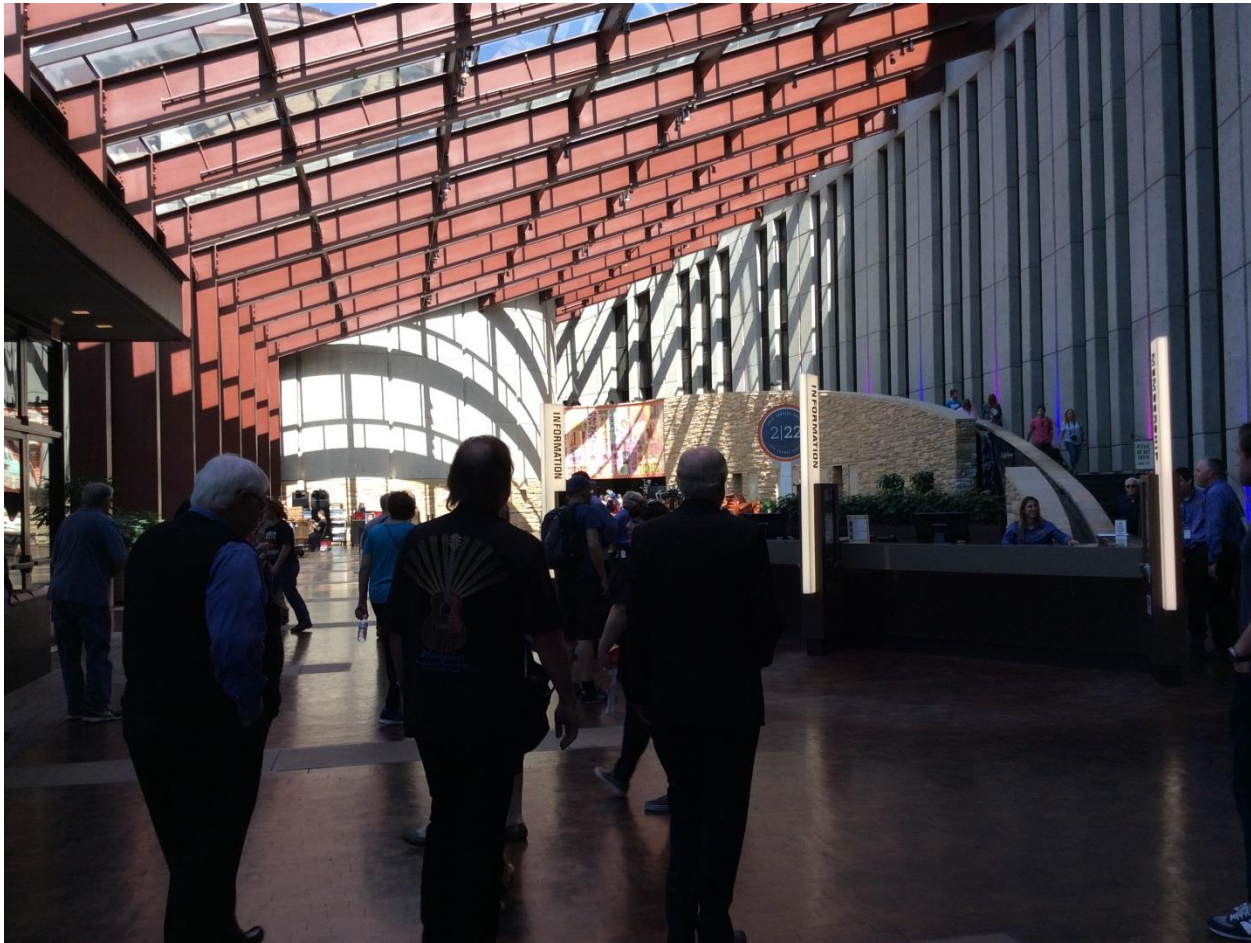
Going to the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum

I might walk by display cases. I can look at the display cases, but I will try not to touch them. I will be very respectful of other museum visitors by walking with my family or group, keeping my hands to myself, and using a quiet voice.



There are two big cars on the 3rd floor. I will have to walk between the cars to get to the stairs to go to the 2nd floor.



At the end of the hall after the cars, I will go down the stairs past the Wall of Gold Records to the 2nd floor.



When I'm on the 2nd floor, I might see more display cases.

I may see an exhibit of Bob Dylan, Johnny Cash and Nashville cats in the museum.





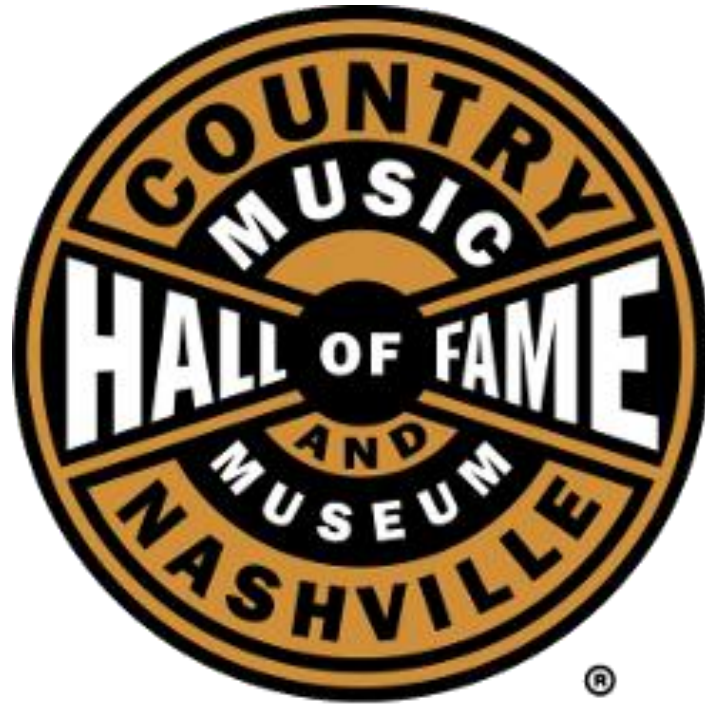
When I am finished looking around the museum, I can go to the Hall of Fame Rotunda. There are plaques with the names and faces of people who made significant contributions to country music.
