## **Adult-Led Time**

Adult-led time refers to a play session that is directed by the adult rather than the child. It is a period of play in which the adult actively guides the child through play-based learning activities. This type of learning is more structured than "free play" and incorporates rules or instructions into the playtime. Balancing adult-led time with child-led time ensures that the student is learning cooperation skills and building trust with adults.

WHAT DOES ADULT-LED TIME LOOK LIKE?
<ul> <li>Adult-directed play that includes rules, games, assessments, reflection-based assignments, instruction, emotional processing, and/or dialogue</li> <li>Can be individualized play or group play</li> <li>Child makes their preference, adult guides the sequence and rules</li> </ul>
WHY DO EDUCATORS IMPLEMENT ADULT-LED TIME?
<ul> <li>□ To facilitate cooperation and collaboration</li> <li>□ To assess a student's competency level</li> <li>□ To facilitate fair play and rule-following</li> <li>□ To organize group activities</li> <li>□ To set and reinforce boundaries</li> </ul>
WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF ADULT-LED TIME?
<ul> <li>Helps teach important social skills such as taking turns</li> <li>Teaches the child through modeling and feedback how to follow directions</li> <li>Provides a model of various problem-solving approaches</li> <li>Offers exposure to a variety of educational opportunities</li> <li>Assists in enhancing fine motor and eye-hand coordination skills in younger children</li> <li>Promotes healthy emotional development, helping child feel understood and valued</li> <li>Promotes active listening skills, rule-following, dialogue, and requires cooperation</li> <li>Strengthens adult-child bond</li> <li>Allows opportunity to guide children through particular social, cognitive, or physical skills</li> </ul>
HOW IS THIS DIFFERENT FROM CHILD-LED TIME?
<ul> <li>The direction of activity is not necessarily determined by child's interest.</li> <li>Children are directed to follow rules and expectations.</li> <li>The child listens/follows adult lead and reflects upon and/or repeats what adult is doing.</li> <li>The adult models the behavior they want to see or expect during play.</li> </ul>



## Routine activities where the adult models and child participates: brushing teeth, washing hands, combing/brushing hair, packing a backpack or lunchbox Musical games where the adult instructs and enforces rules of play, and child participates: Hokey Pokey, Musical Chairs, Musical Statues Educational/Interactive games where the adult instructs and enforces rules of play, and child participates: Simon Says, Red Light Green Light, Duck Duck Goose, Twister, Bingo, Fruit Salad, Telephone
